- The senior students should be studying and working on their assessments at home. ITO be honest at this time of year half an hour for each exam subject should be a minimum for home study.
- This time of year can be stressful for students and families. One father told me that he makes a cup of tea for his son while he is studying. Little things like that can make such a difference.

Our Commitments

The focus for next week is being on time. Students are expected to be at school by 8:30am, and then seated in the correct space in assembly. With the weather due to change to more wintery conditions, your child should have a plan to get to school on wet days on time. With Auckland traffic this often means leaving 10-15 minutes earlier. For those students who are late to school three or more times in a week, they will be given a detention.

Please remind your child that they need to move to class as soon as the first bell goes, and they should be seated, with their books out and bags on the floor ready to learn by the second bell. From time-to-time students may not have finished all the expected work during class time, when this happens in the last period of the day, your child will likely be required to stay behind 5-10 minutes to complete the work to a standard expected at Otahuhu College. Study News

The following message includes important information about NCEA externals. NCEA externals are the exams that students sit, in the hall, from **Monday 6th November** (term 4, week 5) until **Thursday 30th November**.

The expectation is that all senior Ōtāhuhu College students sit all their externals.

To achieve UE@OC students must achieve UE Literacy. **Very often students must pass externals to achieve their UE literacy credits.** UE Literacy is 5 Reading credits (R) and 5 Writing credits (W). B stands for Both.

B credits can be used for reading **or** writing.

The table below shows which subjects have UE literacy credits with the externals.

Correct thinking:

Achieve your externals to get your UE literacy credits.

Notes:

- Students should know which externals they are entered in and target achieving those externals.
 - T2 is open both breaks on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays (and after school by arrangement) to prepare for externals. Resources provided, bring your lunch!
- If you do not achieve UE Lit by the end of year 12 your option choice for year 13 will be limited.

Near the end of term three, the inaugural Duke of Edinburgh group embarked upon its first off-site excursion with a day trip to Rangitoto Island. Although some students found the initial uphill climb quite gruelling, the challenge served as good practice for them and has set the tone for our future more ambitious missions. While exploring the island, it was very interesting to meet staff and students from Saint Kentigern College, a school which had brought several hundred students for an overnight stay on the adjacent Motutapu Island — an inspiring taste of what the incipient Otahuhu College Duke of Edinburgh programme could become in the future. Our day was bookended by a gorgeously scenic ferry journey, another bonus for several students as it marked their first time on a boat.
