<u>Getting to University – Student loans and Allowances</u>

Under the Student Loan Scheme you can borrow money interest-free from the government to help pay for tertiary study, and repay the loan once you finish studying and start earning over a certain amount. There are three parts to a student loan. Students don't have to borrow all three parts.

- Compulsory fees These pay all of your tuition fees. Fees are paid directly to the institution by StudyLink.
- Course-related costs A lump sum for things like stationery, textbooks, childcare, travel or computer equipment. This is paid directly to your bank account.
- Living costs You can borrow up to a set amount each week for living expenses, which is then
 credited directly to your bank account. If you receive a student allowance this will reduce the amount
 you can borrow

OC Numeracy @ home

How old would you be if you lived on Jupiter?

Time passes in different ways when you're in space. Calculate what your age would be if you lived on a different planet!

Would you be older or younger?

Activity length: 25 minutes

What you'll need:

Paper, pen/pencil, calculator, and this worksheet.

It takes the Earth 365 days to orbit around the Sun once. We call this a 'year' or an 'earth year', and all of us use this to measure our age.

The other planets in our solar system take different lengths of time to orbit around the Sun.

So, if you lived on Mercury and society in Mercury also measured age by living through a year, a journey once around the Sun, then you would be a different age right now!

To work out your age on Mercury:

- 1. Mercury takes 88 earth days to travel once around the Sun. Multiply your age in years by 365 to turn your age into days. (e.g. if you are 12 years old, multiply 12 by 365 = 4,380)
- Divide this amount by 88 to give you your age in years on Mercury. (e.g. 4,380/88 = 49 years old)
