### Study News





Unfortunately, COVID hit and then she gave birth to her daughter. Finally, in July of this year she made it across the world to Cambridge University, ranked 5<sup>th</sup> among the top universities in the world, it is one of the oldest in existence. Ms. Norgate gave her time to develop knowledge on new research and approaches to Autism

and the exploration into the Philosophy of Literature. Along the way, individual lectures into disparities in healthcare, literature analysis, Russian politics and biodiversity expanded her awareness of the world.

The study was intense! The expectations at university level are high and there is a lot of focus needed in the lecture room and during discussion with lecturers. The benefits of our staff heading overseas for professional development are that they get to experience varying global views and approaches to specific industries which they can bring back to inform their teaching and the growth of their students. Ms. Norgate feels that the study she has undertaken on the Philosophy of Literature can inform her English teaching, and her work on developing understanding of Autism can very much support the work she is doing as a Junior Dean at Ōtāhuhu College.





It was an intense competition where the students created and added circuitry to their built structures to gain as many points as possible in 2.5 hours. The competition had four challenges which the students could choose from which included the rollercoaster, scooter, washing machine and air conditioning system.

The Senior Teams included Y13 team "Archiebogen" and Y11 team "psch." The Y11 team came in 2nd place and the Y13 team came in 3rd place. The Y11 team made it through to the semi-finals which will be on Wednesday 14 August. The exceptional outcome is due to the hard work of our amazing Y11 and Y13 students dedicating their time towards after school practices in Term 2-3 and school holidays.

The Junior Teams included Y9 team "Ravages," Y10 team "10HB," and Y10 team "The Einsteins." The Junior Teams did not make it to the semi-finals for their Auckland Heats competition as The Einsteins came 5th place, Ravages came 7th place and 10HB at 10th place. The students had good fun and were exposed to regular EPro8 Challenge Competitors from East Auckland high schools.








Mrs Tuialii is preparing for an Ei Katu workshop in the library. A student uses an average of 12 large flowers when making their Ei Katu.


