FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Congratulations to Benjamin Brown and Jacob Paul who came first and second respectively in the Te Ringa Toi exhibition. With over 400 students and 45 schools competing their success is an immense tribute to both their work and dedication, the support from their classmates and outstanding teaching.

Representing one's school at national competitions and spending a week living and breathing your sport in the team environment is an enriching and memorable experience for our young men and women. For many in Year 13, this is the last time they will play for Ōtāhuhu College. They should be proud of what they have given to their school and their responsibility as role models to those students behind them. Thank you to the many staff and parents who, as the coaches, managers, and support crew, have enabled the students to have this opportunity.

It has been a busy few weeks in the curriculum area at College and our Years 12–13 students are now about to start their derived grade exam week. While the purpose of the exams is not just the outcome, and the importance of practising the process and strategy of exams, the results and feedback from teachers also provide the students with clear messages. A reminder to all Year 13 parents that to Graduate Year 13s must attend their exams.

Our Commitments

Our commitment this week is to be respectful. There are simple ways in which we can encourage our children to be respectful. Senior Derived Grade Exams

Students in Y11 Y12 and Y13 have their Derived Grade Exams next week. These Exams are for all subjects that have NZQA External Exams at the end of the Year. These Exams are extremely important for the following reasons:

- 1. Students get an opportunity to experience an 'authentic' Exam experience (similar conditions to what they will have in their end of year Externals).
- 2. Results will show teachers what areas may need to be focussed on to better prepare students for the end of year Externals.



- 3. Results will inform students as to whether they need to continue with and/or modify/change the way in which they study and prepare for their Externals.
- 4. Results could be used for derived grade purposes (only students that sit these exams will be eligible to apply for a derived grade at the end of the year).
- 5. Y13 students that wish to Graduate this year must attend and submit work for these exams.



Congratulations to all our teams and players for their hard work and impressive results!




