Keep a record of their eligibility requirements and deadlines. Begin discussing your financial situation with your family to plan for university expenses. Stay focused on your academic goals, as scholarships often require high grades or community involvement. If you're sitting NCEA assessments mid-year, start preparing now. Reach out to Mr. Finau, the University Navigator, for advice on scholarships and financial aid.

Next week is dominated by Polyfest and the huge effort over this term by students, staff, families and tutors will come to fruition. The dedication and the high levels of performance which have been on display does credit to our whole community.

Our Commitments

Our commitment for next week is to be on time. This means more than just being at school by 8:30am and moving quickly and quietly to class. Good time management is an important aspect of being successful. For our students they need to know when there assignments are due to be handed in.

A good idea is 3 days before the due date for your children to show you their assignments, this way you can check if they have finished, or need to work really hard to get the assignment finished by the due date.

From time to time students may not have finished all the expected work during class time, when this happens in the last period of the day, your child will likely be required to stay behind 5-10 minutes to complete the work to a standard expected at Otahuhu College. If you have any concerns regarding this please contact the Principal.





<u>Attendance</u>

If your child is absent from school, providing a written note explaining the reason is critical. This simple act helps Otahuhu College maintain accurate attendance records and ensures that absences are justified. Whether due to illness or unavoidable family matters, a clear explanation helps us identify patterns and provide the necessary support for students.

Parents and caregivers can email, call, or send a written note with their child. Let's work together to maintain open communication and address any attendance challenges promptly.

Chronic absenteeism has a lifelong impact. Research shows that chronically absent students are far less likely to achieve qualifications and, as adults, earn \$40,000 less annually by age 25. This income gap highlights the importance of addressing absenteeism early.

Otahuhu College ID Cards Students who wish to have an ID card need to

- Have had their photo taken on Thursday at school
- Prepay the card \$15 at the book shop/ Student services, cash or Eftpos
- Once they have paid their order will be placed.

The ID cards are made off site and take several weeks after the photos have been taken to be printed. Cards have value to students who need a legal form of identification e.g. for bank services, Hop cards, and driver's license testing. They are also proof for student discounts.

French Club

Francophiles and francophones from years 9 to 12 have enlivened and dynamised this year's French Club with their curiosity and commitment. Whereas the club was mostly devoted to French film last year, with only a small language component, 2025 has seen a shift to more formalised language instruction. The club is now split into two groups, with rigorous sessions for "experts" three times a week, as well as casual sessions for beginners two times per week.

The expert sessions are populated with Year 11 and 12 students who can no longer take French as a subject but wish to continue with the language, as well as a couple of additional seniors who have learnt French in their own time through apps such as Duolingo and now wish to advance their learning in a more formal group setting. Meanwhile, the beginner sessions attract mostly junior students who are curious about the language. Recently, it has been delightful to see Vikeel Prasad (10HB) and Xiao Omido (10MA) volunteer to take a leadership role during the sessions; they instruct the other junior students on topics they have recently learnt themselves, which consolidates their own knowledge in the process. *Très bon travail* !


